HEALTH AND SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

THINGS TO CONSIDER

RISK LEVEL

FUNERAL HOME

Loved one remains at funeral home, service at funeral home and then to urupā.

At a funeral home, the funeral director will manage all health and safety requirements.

Consider other ways to manaaki your manuhiri rather than a hākari after the tangihanga.

Low risk level

THINGS FOR WHĀNAU TO ENSURE:



NO HONGI, KIHĪ OR AWHI



NO KAI FOR MANUHIRI

AT HOME OR AT MARAE

Loved one is taken home or to marae, service at home or marae and then to urupā.

Tangihanga at home or at marae brings an increased risk. However this can be managed if whānau and manuhiri all agree to maintain health and safety requirements.

- Try to keep tangihanga small
- Hold tangihanga over 1 day
- If longer than 1 day, only whānau pani to stay the night
- Use technology to enable extended whānau to attend
- Consider other ways to manaaki manuhiri rather than hākari.

AT HOME

1 day = Low risk level
2 days = Medium risk level
3 days = Medium risk level

AT MARAE

1 day = Low risk level
2 days = Medium risk level
3 days = High risk level

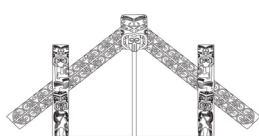

NO KAI FOR MANUHIRI

AT URUPĀ OR CEMETERY

There is generally minimal risk at an urupā or cemetery.

If there is no running water source, whānau to bring bottled water to wash their hands and whakarite themselves.

Low risk level
